Make Your Mark 2017

Last year, the YEA supported the UK Youth Parliament in the campaign 'Make Your Mark'. Overall a total of 954,766 people voted on issues that matter to young people.

The 5 issues to be debated on in parliament are:

- A Curriculum to prepare us for life
- 2. Transport
- Work Experience hubs for 11-18 year olds
- 4. Votes at 16
- 5. Protect LGBT+

In Essex, a total of 15,442 people voted mental health coming out on top, with 2260 votes.

Police Meeting— January 2018

We met in early January to discuss the upcoming events which the YEA are conducting in partnership with Essex Police. We discussed the venue, the catering arrangements and the shadowing day with the police that seven YEA members will take part in.

During the day the YEA members visited the Dog training unit, the Custody suite and the Firearms unit and a short video about the day was created. This video will be launched on Monday 26th November 2018. This event aimed to increase the influence





that the young people have in the police service and making it a service which works for them as well as the general adult population.

Hopefully the event will be a useful one for all the secondary school students who will be invited to attend the day and will provide useful feedback on how the Police and Fire services can interact more effectively with the younger population. -Imogen White (Mid)

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British Youth Council Convention 3

On the 20th January, some members of the YEA, including some of the MYPs and other young people went to Pimlico, London to attend the BYC Convention 3. At the start of the day we received a talk from Sade Brown who runs the charity 2Sour lemons UK", and we learnt all about her background from a young age to the work she does now where she is aiming for more diverse leaders in the creative industry. At this convention we discussed how to successfully run a campaign with the use of a BYC booklet, outlined to crucial steps to having an important campaign, detailing who to contact, what barriers we might face and how to overcome those barriers. As a background for the campaign we used the 2 issues that came out as the top two that UKYP were going to focus on from the debate at the House of Commons on the 10th November 2017. These two issues were Votes at 16 and Curriculum for life. Further in the day, the young people looked at the NHS Youth Forum and what they do and what Peer Support is. The MYPs looked at UKYP as a whole and reflected on their year and what they had achieved so far. At the end of the day, we looked at celebrating the achievements of individuals

and hearing from other members of the UKYP and that they had done in their areas and what issues they have been facing, such as budget cuts. Overall we found the day very beneficial and we met other members of UKYP and Youth Councillors. We are looking forward to going to the next convention and the upcoming residential where we hope to make new friends!

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Youth Conference— November 2017



As the Young Essex Assembly, we came up with the idea of organising a Youth Voice Development Day, with the aim of encouraging young people to engage in politics and democracy. With the help of the YEA youth workers, Belle, Caitlin, Katy, Imogen and I organised and ran the Chelmsford Racecourse and we invited Year 8 and Year 9 students from over 20 schools. The day consisted of five workshops designed to help the students develop skills for their future. The first workshop was based around budgeting, where we had pupils engage in discussions about how they think the country's money should be spent and how it is actually spent. The second workshop

involved debating skills; a statement was given and students in the audience were asked to give their opinions on it. It was great to see how eager these students were to share their opinions and we were amazed by their well thought out points. In the third Transformation Support workshop we taught the event on the 15th November at students how to write a formal Council. We gave all the letter to their head teacher. We tried to make this experience as realistic as possible by giving them an envelope and a small post box. In the fourth workshop, we provided the groups with the "Make Your Mark" topics and asked them to create a campaign based on one of these topics. Again, we were impressed by the creativity shown, the depth of their action plans and how they

applied the skills they had learnt before to this task. Our final workshop was preparing questions to ask our guests: Councillor Ray Gooding, John Aldridge, the Chairman of Essex County Council, Lisa Wilson, Commissioning and Officer at Essex County students an opportunity to ask our panel excellent questions, which included our very own member, Caitlin Kemp. We then gave all the students socks and shirts to write what they liked about the day on shirts and what could be improved on the socks. Some of the bigger issues we found were that there were dated photos that need to be updated, as many of the current members don't appear in them. Also, the two social media pages are not in valid use, so they either need to be deleted permanently, or changed to new accounts. During our residential in half term, we will be discussing the website and organizing times to improve it.

This will encourage young people to submit themselves for elections in the upcoming year.
